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Eight Undergraduate Programs Recognized for Assessment Practices: 2024 WSU Celebration of Assessment Excellence

On November 5th, the Office of the Provost, Division of Academic Engagement and Student Achievement (DAESA), and Office of Assessment for Curricular Effectiveness (ACE) hosted the [2024 WSU Celebration of Assessment Excellence](#), shining a spotlight on good practices in learning outcomes assessment and the efforts of program faculty, faculty assessment coordinators, chairs, and directors, representing diverse academic programs and colleges.

Eight WSU undergraduate degree programs were recognized for using assessment results from direct measures of program learning outcomes collected near the end of the curriculum to improve curriculum, instruction, assignments, and/or faculty/TA development over the past two years.

Overall, the event illuminated how effective program assessment contributes to WSU's educational quality, student achievement, and land-grant mission in varying disciplines and over multiple campuses. With over 1,500 students currently admitted to these eight degree programs, improvements to curriculum and instruction informed by program assessment have the potential to benefit a substantial number of WSU undergraduates.

Program Assessment Spotlight: A Streamlined Approach to Assessing Student Achievement of Program Learning Outcomes (Journalism and Media Production)

An effective system of assessing student learning includes measures collected near the end of the curriculum, providing information about what students are able to achieve at the end of the program. For many undergraduate programs, these measures include the evaluation of student performance in 400-level courses, based on coursework that demonstrates specific program-level student learning outcomes.

WSU's Journalism and Media Production, BA degree program has worked since spring 2023 to pilot and scale up a process where instructors of selected 400-level courses for each of the program's four majors use student work products in their own courses – papers, presentations, or other types of assignments – to evaluate student achievement of program learning outcomes. Specifically, participating faculty use their expert judgement to fill out an assessment form that collects a mix of quantitative data (evaluation of the number of students at each level of performance on a rating scale for the program learning outcome that are appropriate to the course context and assignments) and qualitative data (comments about strengths and weaknesses in student performance on program learning outcomes). 2023 Examples of Direct Measures Collected Near the End of the Curriculum at WSU

WSU expects undergraduate degree programs to regularly collect direct measures near the end of the curriculum, providing programs with information about student achievement of program-level student learning outcomes as students are completing the curriculum. WSU encourages programs to choose measures that provide useful information to their faculty and fit with disciplinary expectations.

Each year, we compile [selected examples of direct measures collected near the end of the curriculum by WSU undergraduate degree programs](#), as reported in the annual undergraduate degree program assessment reports. The examples are intended to show a range of direct measures collected near the end of the curriculum and are not intended to be exhaustive or show all measures collected by WSU programs.

Direct measures are assessments (by faculty or other professionals) of student work products or performances that provide demonstrated evidence of program-level student learning outcomes (SLOs) (i.e., skills and knowledge). Direct measures come in many forms and may vary to best meet the needs of a program.

An Approach to Making Learning Outcomes Assessment Data More Actionable

Program assessment activities and results are intended to inform regular faculty reflection and discussion about effective teaching, learning, and curricula, and ultimately contribute to decision-making to support student learning. In her article, [Meaningful Measurement](#), Gloria Rogers (Senior Adjunct Director for Professional Offerings at ABET) describes how defining program-level student learning outcomes into a few measurable performance indicators or criteria can help faculty identify strengths and weakness in student performance.
