### Guidance on the Use of Generative AI to Support Program-level Assessment Activities

Generative artificial intelligence (GenAI) tools have the potential to support a variety of program assessment activities throughout the assessment cycle. WSU’s Office of the Provost supports the use of GenAI in work processes that can help faculty and staff be more efficient and effective. However, individuals must use GenAI responsibly with constant attention to the security of private and protected data. Responsible use includes making sure that users understand the applications and limitations of GenAI while also ensuring that any use of GenAI is done ethically and is consistent with university policies and regulations. ### Reminder: Please Help Promote NSSE 2025 in March and April

In March and April, eligible seniors and first-year students on each WSU campus are receiving emails asking that they respond to the [National Survey of Student Engagement \(NSSE\)](#). NSSE opened on March 3<sup>rd</sup> and remains open through the end of the semester; however, students must complete the survey by April 19<sup>th</sup> to be eligible for the drawings for the \$100 Visa gift cards. Regular reminders to students in March and into April about NSSE would be greatly appreciated. After each administration, our office collaborates with WSU’s Office of Strategy, Planning, and Analysis (formerly the Office of Institutional Research) to disaggregate results for undergraduate degree programs and colleges, focusing on responses from seniors. These disaggregated NSSE reports are distributed to WSU programs in which 10 or more seniors respond to survey. ### Program Assessment Spotlight: Examining NSSE Results to Assess the Student Experience (Psychology)

In 2024, the Psychology Department reviewed 2023 NSSE results from their senior majors across all campuses alongside responses from all WSU seniors. Reviewing these NSSE results helped Psychology faculty examine the student experience in a variety of areas of interest, including:

- Students’ participation in high impact practices, such as capstone and research experiences
- Students’ perceived gains in various knowledge, skills, and abilities aligned with Psychology’s program learning outcomes

Additionally, the Psychology faculty compared their NSSE results with the results from their internally developed senior exit survey and other available assessment data as part of a self-study for a comprehensive program review. The process of triangulating self-reported assessment data (to see if the same trends appear) can help increase the validity and credibility of the results. Triangulated findings can also provide more reliable evidence to help program faculty determine strengths and identify opportunities for improvement. [>> Read More ...](#)

### Program Assessment Spotlight: Using Curriculum Mapping to Inform Curricular Decisions (English)

Following a refresh of the program-level student learning outcomes (SLOs) for the BA in English by faculty, the Department of English undertook an initiative to update their curriculum maps for each of their major options. The Undergraduate Studies Committee, comprised of representatives from each option and campus, began by reviewing course-level SLOs from all required courses and aligning these with the updated program-level SLOs to draft revised curriculum maps using a template adapted from WSU’s Office of Assessment for Curricular Effectiveness.

Then, in spring 2024, the department held a curriculum mapping retreat with faculty who teach core courses within all six major options and from all four campuses where the degree is offered. Faculty in each option worked to review and refine the curriculum maps and discuss the alignment of course-level and program-level SLOs. [>> Read More ...](#)

### Smith Teaching and Learning Grant Applications Due March 14

WSU’s Vice Provost for Academic Engagement and Student Achievement is soliciting [Smith Teaching and Learning Grant](#) proposals around innovative ideas that enhance teaching and learning at WSU. The focus area for 2025-2026 encompasses a broad range of teaching and learning transformations, including those connected to program-level assessment. Successful proposals must address one or more of the [Eight Principles of Effective Teaching](#) outlined by the [Center for Teaching and Learning at the University of Texas](#). For example, projects may address aligning program learning outcomes, assessments, and activities, scaffolding program learning outcomes across the curriculum, developing methods to assess program learning outcomes, and/or using program assessment data to support student learning and inform instruction.

Proposals, including a signed endorsement by the applicant’s chair, can be submitted through an [online application form](#) through **March 14, 2025**. Smith grants will be awarded in amounts up to \$5,000 and announced in early April. See the [Request for Proposals \(PDF\)](#) for more information.

### Updating Program-level Student Learning Outcomes in the WSU Catalog

As outlined in the [university’s EPPM \(PDF\)](#), undergraduate degree programs must publish program-level student learning outcomes (SLOs) in the [WSU Catalog](#). If your program has recently updated its program-level SLOs, please inform the Office of the Registrar by completing the following steps:

- Copy and paste the current presentation of your program’s SLOs from the catalog into a Word document
- Use track changes (or strikethrough and underline) to update the document to reflect the program’s new SLOs
- Email the document to [wsu.catalog@wsu.edu](mailto:wsu.catalog@wsu.edu) and CC your chair/director

Alternatively, programs can update their program-level SLOs in the WSU catalog through the annual call for updates from the Office of the Registrar, typically sent in late spring to the administrative officer of each academic unit.

### Transitions in the Faculty Assessment Coordinator Role in Your Department, School, or Program for AY 2025-26

### FYI – WSU’s Upcoming Regional Accreditation Visit

Program-level assessment is key to WSU’s demonstration of regular and systematic assessment as required by our regional accreditor, the [Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities \(NWCCU\)](#). Next spring, WSU will begin drafting the self-study for its Evaluation of Institutional Effectiveness (EIE) comprehensive review, which includes standards related to student learning, curriculum, and assessment, in advance of a peer evaluation visit in spring 2027. One goal of [annual undergraduate program assessment reporting at WSU](#) is to document regular assessment activities and uses to help meet these accreditation standards. Reports submitted by undergraduate programs in recent years, as well as the reports due next February about 2025 activities, will provide key evidence to demonstrate an effective, regular, and comprehensive system of assessment of student achievement.
